Dear Guests.

Twenty five years ago, domestic violence was not yet a household word but, rather, a "family secret." Fast forward to today and this secret has been let out of the bottle. Legal progress has been made. While the issue continues, the public has become aware. Domestic and partner violence now include criminal consequences.

While the founding group of AFW fought for the rights of women to be safe and seen, we are once again raising our collective voices. Women and children are now facing another silent killer: the trafficking of human beings. Fueled by pornography, mainly targeting at risk young women and, sadly, children, human trafficking has reached the same epidemic proportions. While not as newsworthy as the coronavirus, it is spreading just as quickly and affecting those whose voices, as with domestic violence, are neither heard nor their faces seen.

2020 Honorees

SANDRA DAY O'CONNOR LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Gretchen Carlson



Journalist, author, and empowerment advocate Gretchen Carlson paved the way for the #MeToo movement, with her historic 2016 sexual harassment complaint against the chairman of Fox News, Roger Ailes. Named one of Time Magazine's "100 Most Influential People in the World," Carlson is one of America's most successful news anchors, as well as a globally recognized advocate for female empowerment, with her TED Talk on the subject garnering almost 2 million views. She is also the celebrated author of the New York Times bestseller "Be Fierce."

In December 2019, Carlson founded the organization "Lift Our Voices"

with former Fox News colleagues Julie Roginsky and Diana Falzone. Its mission is to end the practice of Non-Disclosure Agreements, confidentiality provisions and forced arbitration clauses that have prevented employees from publicly discussing and disclosing toxic workplace conditions, including sexual harassment and assault.

Carlson previously hosted "The Real Story" on Fox News and co-hosted the number-one rated cable morning news show, "Fox and Friends," for more than seven years.

Carlson's most recent return to television, as host and executive producer of A+E and Lifetime Network documentaries "Breaking The Silence," "Beyond The Headlines: NXIVM Cult" and "Beyond The Headlines: The College Admissions Scandal." Her return is a beacon of hope for other brave women demoted, fired or blacklisted from their chosen careers after reporting sexual harassment.

Carlson started her television career as a political reporter in Richmond, Virginia, and then served as an anchor and reporter in Cincinnati, Cleveland, and Dallas. In 2000 Carlson moved to national news as co-host and correspondent on CBS'

"The Saturday Early Show," where she covered some of the world's biggest stories, including the 9-11 terrorist attack from the World Trade Center, the Bush-Gore election, and Oklahoma City Bomber Tim McVeigh's execution. She also reported and produced a 30-part series on domestic violence that won several national awards.

In 2016, Carlson became the face of workplace harassment survivors, gracing the covers of Time and Good Housekeeping magazines. Carlson's book "Be Fierce" debuted in October 2017 and immediately a New York Times bestseller. Her memoir "Getting Real," published in 2015 was also a best-seller. Profits from "Be Fierce" go to Carlson's Gift of Courage Fund, which supports organizations empowering women and young girls. This year the fund is providing free workshops to low-income women facing gender-based discrimination and violence through the Gretchen Carlson Leadership Initiative and supporting the March of Dimes' Gretchen Carlson Advocacy Fellows.

Since her harassment complaint became public, Carlson has worked fearlessly to change laws that protect predators. In December 2017, she joined a bi-partisan coalition of legislators to introduce the "Ending Forced Arbitration of Sexual Harassment Act," which voids forced arbitration agreements that prevent sexual harassment survivors from getting their day in court. The bill was reintroduced in the House in February 2019 and Carlson testified before the House Judiciary Committee in May.

Carlson's advocacy has been honored by numerous organizations, including the New York Women in Communications' Matrix Award; the Radio Television Digital News Association's First Amendment Leadership Award; the National Organization for Women's 2018 Women of Power and Influence Award; and the YWCA Greater Los Angeles' 2018 Phenomenal Champion of Change.

An honors graduate of Stanford University, Carlson was valedictorian of her high school class and studied at Oxford University in England. A violin prodigy, she performed as a soloist with the Minnesota Orchestra at age 13, and in 1989 became the first classical violinist to win the Miss America crown.

Carlson is married to sports agent Casey Close. The couple lives in Greenwich with their two teenage children.

Christi Paul



You will find Christi Paul every weekend morning anchoring CNN New Day as well as anchoring and reporting for HLN during the week.

Christi is a wife and mother of three daughters and as such, has a passion for helping children and teens. She serves on the National Advisory Council for the One Love Foundation in honor of Yeardley Love, the University of Virginia Lacrosse player beaten to death by her boyfriend,

and is also involved with Girl Talk Inc., an organization where high school girls mentor middle school girls to help build self esteem and combat bullying.

Tired of simply having to tell viewers news stories about children who are missing, Christi took action to help, founding "Find Our Children," a partnership with The National Center for Missing and Exploited Children in Washington, DC. HLN featured a segment about a missing child, asking viewers to help find them and to date, 35 of the profiled children have been brought home safe and sound. In 2012 NCMEC honored Christi with their prestigious Hope Award, an award she shares with past winners such as former Secretary of State Colin Powell, then-Senator Joe Biden and actor Ben Affleck.

Christi is also an author. Published in 2012, her book "Love Isn't Supposed to Hurt", discusses her journey in overcoming verbal and emotional abuse. It immediately hit Amazon's top 20 and she recorded two songs in Nashville that coincide with the book - "Wake Up In It" and "Free" can both be found on iTunes. Christi is no stranger to singing as she's sung onstage with Grammy winners Richard Marx and David Foster as well as singing the National Anthem at professional sporting events.

Prior to joining HLN in 2003, Christi was an anchor, consumer reporter and weathercaster in Phoenix. First at KNXV, then at CNN affiliate KTVK where she created a segment with the Arizona Humane Society which helped hundreds of abandoned animals find new homes with families in the valley.

Barbara L. Strachan



Barbara Strachan has been building inclusive programs for Girl Scouts from all walks of life for more than 20 years. She serves as Director of Social Impact Programs for Girl Scouts–Arizona Cactus-Pine Council which delivers various programs in jails, prisons, detention centers, group homes, homeless and domestic violence shelters, Title I schools, community centers, refugee and Native American communities. She was instrumental in co-creating the Adelante Jovencitas (Young Women

Moving Forward) program which received the FBI Directors Community Leadership Award.

To deliver these site-specific programs, Strachan developed partnerships with organizations in the justice system, educational arena and others. In addition, she forged a partnership with several Arizona State University colleges to provide internship opportunities for students, giving them real world, hands on experience. Each intern receives personal coaching, mentoring and networking opportunities directly from her.

Strachan has been involved in the anti-human trafficking movement in Arizona for over 20 years. She is a member of the City of Phoenix Human Trafficking Task Force, serves on the board of the Arizona Anti-Trafficking Network and the advisory committee for Starfish Place, a supportive housing option for women who have been trafficked, and their children. This issue holds particular importance for her, and she generously gives her time in the areas of advocacy, education and outreach when asked.

She holds a Bachelor of Arts in Social and Behavioral Science and a Master's in Education from Northern Arizona University, graduating with Distinction. Strachan has attended numerous leadership development programs like Oxford Leadership Academy, The Ashland Institute, Blanchard Self-Leadership, and Valley Leadership - Class 30. She is currently working on her dissertation for a doctorate degree in organizational leadership.

Strachan believes in the potential of every woman and girl to become strong, courageous leaders who can make a positive difference in their own lives and in the world.

SANDRA DAY O'CONNOR LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Past Honorees

Sandra Day O'Connor Lifetime Achievement Award

The Sandra Day O'Connor Lifetime Achievement Award is given annually to a woman who has distinguished herself through her leadership and contributions to society through her lifetime achievements and work specifically benefitting women and families. The first award was presented at the first annual Awards Luncheon in 1997.



1997 HONORABLE SANDRA DAY O'CONNOR

Sandra Day O'Connor, the first woman named to the U.S. Supreme Court, has made history through her appointment, breaking the ultimate "glass ceiling" in the legal profession. She has forever shattered the idea that women were not qualified to serve on the nation's highest court – and by her role model, further opened the door for women at all levels of the legal profession.



1998 | ELIZABETH DOLE

Elizabeth Dole, former director of the American Red Cross, began her career as a U.S. public official during the Johnson administration. In January 1999, she announced her candidacy for the Republican presidential nomination in the 2000 election. Despite withdrawing from the race before the primaries began, Mrs. Dole made a powerful statement to the world about the strength of women in politics.



1999 | TIPPER GORE

As an advocate for family issues and a champion for the homeless and mentally ill, Mrs. Gore's commitment to mending tattered families makes her one of our most sympathetic national nurturers. Mrs. Gore is a devoted mother of four children and wife of former Vice President Al Gore. She is recognized throughout the world as a champion and advocate on behalf of families, women and children.

SANDRA DAY O'CONNOR LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Past Honorees



2000 | MARIAN WRIGHT EDELMAN

Marian Wright Edelman, civil rights activist and founder of the Children's Defense Fund (CDF), has dedicated her life to helping those in need. She founded CDF in the 1970s to apply pressure on the federal government to help poor children and to coordinate nationwide activities to help children. Mrs. Edelman continues her advocacy today, focusing on Head Start, health care, and support for homeless children.



2001 | ERIN BROCKOVICH

Erin Brockovich, the crusading paralegal whose story was made into a hit movie, is a stellar example of how one woman can make a world of difference. As a single mother struggling to support her three children, Ms. Brockovich took a job as a file clerk, which led to her investigation of a toxic leak that devastated the health of an entire community. Her persistence resulted in the largest direct action lawsuit of its kind, paying \$333 million to more than 600 people.



2002 | BARBARA BUSH

Rarely has a First Lady been greeted by the American people with the warmth accorded to "everybody's grandmother," Barbara Bush. A strong advocate of volunteerism, Mrs. Bush helped many causes – including children's issues, the homeless, AIDS, the elderly, and school volunteer programs. She is also the Honorary Chairman of the Barbara Bush Foundation for Family Literacy.



2003 | SALLY RIDE

Sally Ride soared higher than any other woman as the first female American astronaut. She spent 10 years in the corps, flying on the 7th and 13th Shuttle flights. After the 1986 Challenger disaster, Ms. Ride moved to Washington, D.C., as part of the presidential investigation commission. Before her death in 2012, she founded Imaginary Lines, which is devoted to encouraging girls to pursue the fields of math, science and engineering.

Past Honorees



2004 YVONNE FEDDERSON AND SARA O'MEARA

These two dynamic women are not only co-founders of Childhelp USA, a nonprofit organization dedicated to the treatment, prevention and research of child abuse and neglect, but they are also best friends. Ms. Fedderson and Ms. O'Meara have dedicated their lives to their work for children. They have received a national Lifetime Achievement Award from President George W. Bush and First Lady Laura Bush and a nomination for the 2005 Nobel Peace Prize.



2005 | PAT MITCHELL

Under Ms. Mitchell's leadership from 2000 to 2006, the Public Broadcasting Service (PBS) energized and rejuvenated its programming and strengthened its commitment to serve the American public. Ms. Mitchell expanded PBS' public affairs offerings and renewed its commitment to education through daily shows such as Sesame Street and Reading Rainbow, enhanced teacher resources, curriculum and literary initiatives.



2006 | MARLO THOMAS

As an actress, producer, author and social activist, Ms. Thomas has championed women's issues throughout her career. She is a founding director of the Ms. Foundation for Women and member of the board of the National Women's Political Caucus. Ms. Thomas has dedicated her work with St. Jude Children's Research Hospital to benefit children dealing with catastrophic diseases.



2007 | LAURA BUSH

Mrs. Laura Bush has actively been involved in issues of national and global concern, with a particular emphasis on education, healthcare and human rights. She has worked tirelessly to call attention to the need for schools, teachers and libraries, both in the United States and abroad. Through Helping America's Youth initiative, Mrs. Bush has visited mentoring programs around the country to support young people becoming strong, productive adults.

SANDRA DAY O'CONNOR LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Past Honorees



2008 | JANET NAPOLITANO

Janet Napolitano, former Arizona Governor and U.S. Director of Homeland Security in the Obama Administration, worked tirelessly on behalf of Arizona's women and children in her role as our state's top public leader. One of her top accomplishments for women was to create public funding to address the domestic violence "turn away" problem throughout the state.



2009 | MADELEINE K. ALBRIGHT

Dr. Albright served our nation as Secretary of State with dedication to the pursuit of democratic ideals and human rights. Her illustrious career has included numerous roles, from the United Nations to the State Department and beyond Dr. Albright has worked to achieve greater global understanding and to secure human rights so that our world is safer, more civil, and secure.



2010 | ANDREA JUNG

Ms. Jung has used her visibility as the first female CEO of Avon to better the standing of women in all walks of life. Due to her personal commitment to addressing domestic violence and the terrible toll it takes, Avon has donated more than \$16 million to end violence against women, and has launched an international initiative on justice for women and girls.



2011 | BILLIE JEAN KING

Named one of the "100 Most Important Americans of the 20th Century" by Life Magazine, and a 2009 recipient of the Presidential Medal of Freedom, Ms. King, an international tennis superstar, has long been a tireless pioneer for social justice. Known for boldly breaking down barriers, she is recognized for spearheading the women's movement in tennis and for her lifelong pursuit of equality in sports and in life.

2012 | FRANCES HESSELBEIN

Frances Hesselbein is a shining beacon honored many times over for her service as a pioneer for women, volunteerism, diversity and opportunity. As president and CEO of the Frances Hesselbein Leadership Institute (formerly the Peter F. Drucker Foundation for Nonprofit Management) and CEO of the Girl Scouts of the U.S.A., she has been honored with a Presidential Medal of Freedom by President Bill Clinton and two Presidential Commissions on National and Community Service by President George H. W. Bush.



2013 | GOLDIE HAWN

Actress Goldie Hawn has dedicated much of her life to improving the well-being of women and children. Through The Hawn Foundation and its signature program, MindUPTM, Ms. Hawn has helped equip children and educators with the emotional literacy skills they need to navigate the challenges of the world. Her dedication to helping children lead smarter, healthier and happier lives compelled Ms. Hawn to author several best selling books to inspire children and parents alike.



2014 | MARILYN CARLSON NELSON

Marilyn Carlson Nelson, who is former chairman and chief executive officer of Carlson, a global travel and hospitality company, has appeared on Forbes magazine's list as one of "The World's 100 Most Powerful Women" and one of "America's Best Leaders," according to U.S. News & World Report. Under her leadership, Ms. Nelson's company was the first major North American travel company to take a stand against the sexual exploitation of children in the tourism industry.



2015 | CINDY HENSLEY MCCAIN

Cindy Hensley McCain has dedicated her life to improving the lives of those less fortunate, both in the U.S. and around the world. As co-chair of the Arizona Governor's Council on human trafficking and on the McCain Institute's Human Trafficking Advisory Council, she is dedicated to reducing this worldwide epidemic and improving the lives of victims.

2016 | MARIA SHRIVER

Mother of four. Peabody- and Emmy-winning journalist and producer. Six-time New York Times best-selling author. NBC News Special Anchor. Women's advocate. Alzheimer's activist. Voice for the voiceless. Maria Shriver has long been a champion for women's empowerment, economic entrepreneurship and social justice, while also lending her voice as an advocate on behalf of the poor, the intellectually disabled and families struggling with Alzheimer's.



2018 | ASHLEY JUDD

Having won major acting awards worldwide, Judd demonstrates her range in a variety of genres and is a proven box office draw. Presently, she serves as Global Goodwill Ambassador for UNFPA, is the Global Ambassador for Population Services International, and also for Polaris Project.
